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Little Red Riding Hood

Who can tell the story of Little Red Riding Hood?





Story structure

Hero – The main character

Situation A – The beginning of the story

Situation B – The final situation (Hero got new insights, learned a lesson, evolved)

Trigger – Reason why the hero goes from Situation A to situation B.

Helpers – characters, events, thoughts, objects that help the hero

Opponents - characters, events, thoughts, objects that act as obstacles to the hero

VIDEO: Transition as doctor enters consulting room.
VO: "Whatever is needed."



VIDEO: Doctor exits lift into walkway of housing acc.
VO: "Expertise is flexibility."



VIDEO: Walks towards a front door.
VO: Music overlay.



VIDEO: Doctor with patient inside.
VO: "Growing from each new experience."



VIDEO: Doctor goes to leave patients house.
VO: "Expertise is adapting and changing."



VIDEO: Door opens to doctor in academic setting.
VO: "Expertise is always learning."
